CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

This course introduces fundamental skills and theories of accurate observational drawing including contour line, perspective, and shading. Media used include, but not limited to, pencil, ink, and charcoal. Designed for art majors. (CSU) (UC) (DEGREE CREDIT)

This course is conducted ENTIRELY ONLINE and uses CANVAS. Students must log onto this course and follow the directions of the instructor by the first day of class, 1/25/21. **Please email instructor by 1/25/21**, stating that you have read and understand the course syllabus.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

This course introduces fundamental skills and theories of accurate observational drawing including contour line, perspective and shading. Media used include but not limited to: pencil, ink and charcoal.

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to do the following:

- 1. Manipulate drawing materials such as graphite, charcoal, and ink to record form, space and light.
- 2. Create representations of objects.
- 3. Analyze the relationship of form and space and reproduce it on paper.
- 4. Analyze the aesthetic components in terms of composition.
- 5. Explore the expressive as well as the technical use of materials.
- 6. Discuss perceptual philosophies.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Upon successful completion of ART 182 F Basic Drawing, the student will be able to create a series of drawings that demonstrate contour line, perspective, value drawing and implied texture in graphite and/or charcoal and/or ink.
- 2. Upon successful completion of ART 182 F Basic Drawing, the student will be able to analyze and arrange visual components according to recognized design standards.

THE FOLLOWING SCHEDULE OF TOPICS IS SUBJECT TO CHANGE AS NEEDED.

LINE: (WEEKS ONE TO SIX) 1/25 - 3/1

Demonstrations and lectures on the following topics:

- Gesture, cross-contour, varied line weight, measuring, positive and negative shape and structural line.

Strategies to enable the artist to simplify the complex structures into manageable units based on geometric solids.

- Class work will cover drawing various still life set ups from observation using a range of graphite pencils.

PERSPECTIVE: (WEEKS SIX TO NINE) 3/1 - 3/22

- Continuation and development of concepts introduced in the first week and relating them to the issues of perspective.
- Demonstrations and lecture of the basic issues of 1 and 2-point perspective.
- Drawings will be completed using graphite pencils.

VALUE: (WEEKS NINE TO the end of the semester) 3/22 - 5/21

- Creation and study of a value scale, analysis of positive and negative shapes, composition, functions of light logic, the function of value as shapes (open and closed shape), form in space. Working on Toned Paper, Atmospheric Perspective,
- Drawings will be completed using ink, charcoal and carbon pencils.

Final Composition Assignment Due - Wednesday, 5/19

 This is the general pace of the class. Special assignments or slight modification of the syllabus may occur in order to accommodate students' needs and to solve specific drawing problems that come up.

HOMEWORK AND GRADING POLICY:

You will receive a response that includes your grade for each drawing assignment as well as an explanation of the strengths and weakness of the work.

All assignments are graded from A to F according to how successfully it solves these issues:

- How well you grasped the concept of each topic and assignment. Excellence in critical thinking and performance within the domain of the course.
- The aesthetic quality of the assignment.
- Disciplined creativity.
- The depth of your involvement in the assignment, as seen in your completed work (energy and concentration).
- Conceptual and expressive development, (visual intelligence, power of perception, and disciplined creative sensitivity).
- Skill and style development (craftsmanship and technique).
- Effort devoted to work, as evidenced in finished work- working a long time does not in itself warrant a high grade- work must meet aesthetic and craftsmanship standards to achieve an "A" or "B" grade.

Note: Longer assignments will be weighted more heavily than shorter assignments. Other factors affecting the outcome of grades:

- Watching all lecture and drawing demonstrations for class projects
- On time completion of assignments
- Class participation
- Presentation (keeping your projects in presentable condition. No tears, creases, unnecessary smudging of material, etc.)

Fulfilling the description of each drawing project successfully. Topics Include:

- Gesture and line
- Accurate depiction of shapes as a whole and of their parts.
- Understanding of perspective and structure to create form in space.
- Clear values consistent with the light source used to create volume.
- Design and Composition

Spending a great deal of time working on a project does NOT by itself warrant a higher grade. Your work must show clear evidence of an understanding of the topic outlined within any given project.

Assignments must be done well, carefully, and on time to the teacher's satisfaction. Late homework assignments will be lowered one letter grade.
